The ReNewal Team (Cora Hocker, Lori and Jesse Schlunegger, Ali David, Joe Goeden, Don Bosley and myself) meet monthly to discuss and plan this Revival process. We are being guided by Vital Congregations which is an office within our denomination, The Presbyterian Church USA.

A Vital congregation is one that is largely defined by having 7 healthy "Marks" or what can be called "systems."

Here are the "marks" along with questions to ask after listening to the sermon on that particular "mark."

1. Lifelong Discipleship Formation1.

"Am I being formed more and more into the image of Jesus? Am I growing in my faith? Is the fruit of the Spirit more evident in my life than it was 3 years ago?"

2. Intentional Authentic Evangelism2.

"Do I understand that every day I am a witness to the faith? What are my top 2 styles of being a witness? Am I an effective witness? Will I take the Sharing Faith Class taught in August?"

3. Outward Incarnational Focus

"Do I have a servant attitude of others over myself?"

4. Empower Servant Leadership

"Do I know my spiritual gifts and am I using them to serve?"

5. Spirit-inspired Worship

"Do I prepare myself each week for Gathered Worship? Am I consistently inspired in Gathered Worship? Do I think? Do I feel? Do I do something different as a result of GW?

6. Caring Relationships.

"Do I actively care for others in and outside of the church?"

7. Ecclesiastical health.

What Can you Do?

- 1. Attend Sunday Gathered Worship and/or listen to the sermon on the link sent out each week.
- 2. Bible Study Sunday afternoon or Wednesday evening.
- 3. Do the Bible Studies in the bulletin.
- 4. Attend the Vital Congregations Luncheon in April/May (Date will be announced soon).
- 5. Fill out a survey (Within a few weeks).
- 6. Pray please join me and the ReNewal Team is praying for the reviving of Trinity.

MONEY MATTERS, PER CAPITA

Perhaps one of the most confusing aspects of how the Presbyterian Church functions is "per-capita." Each year Trinity encourages its members to pay their per-capita apportionment. What is "per-capita"? Why do we do this? Where does this money go?

What? One of the great strengths of our denomination is that it is so inter-connected. Trinity is tied to the larger Church ministry. One form of that connection is through our per-capita. Every Presbyterian Church in the country is required to pay a specific amount for each active member on its rolls to their respective Presbytery. *Per Capita rates are not "bills" or "dues" that are "charged" to members; however, this is an expense for Trinity.* This year, Trinity's per-capita apportionment is **\$31.26** per member.

Why? Each governing body above our Session has staff members and expenses that support the work of the Church. These individuals have no congregation to support their Ministry, but they are essential to the life of the Presbyterian Church.

Where? The per-capita payments for Trinity are split 4 ways, for the work of our: 1) General Assembly PC USA (\$9.85); Synod of the Pacific (\$5.22); North Central California Presbytery (\$15.19); and Presbytery's Pastoral Emergency Care Fund (\$1.00).

If you haven't done so already, please make out a check payable to Trinity Presbyterian Church in the amount of \$31.26 for each active church member in your household. This is a gift we invite our congregation (not just members) to give as part of a larger faith community rather than just "our own." Some of our members may not be able to afford this, so we can help cover each other as part of our covenantal relationship with the larger denomination. Make a note on your check that it is to be used for per-capita. You can mail your check to Trinity, drop it by the church office, or put it in the offering plate on Sunday mornings.

A Story of Hope...

I enjoy books written by author Lee Jackson who wrote the "After Dunkirk" series—fictional, but based on the WWII Battle of Dunkirk. In his research, he discovered miraculous stories of bravery and kindness, not usually found on the battleground. Here is one he recently related in his newsletter...

... As the Battle of the Bulge raged in the Ardennes Forest, three American soldiers, one badly wounded, were separated from their unit and lost in the snow. After three days of walking and trying to find their way back to American lines with the sounds of guns all around them, they came upon a small cabin in the woods. It was Christmas Eve. The cabin belonged to the Vincken family. The mother, Elizabeth, and her twelve-year-old son, Fritz, were alone in the cabin. Mr. Vincken was gone, serving as a civil defense fire guard. Elizabeth opened the door to a knock, only to find two American soldiers standing there, another one lying in the snow. Startled, she invited them in, knowing full-well that the penalty for giving aid to the enemy was death. The soldiers warmed themselves by the fire as Elizabeth prepared a meal. Fritz stared at the soldiers in wonder as another knock came on the door. They opened the door, thinking more American soldiers might be seeking shelter. However, four German soldiers, also lost in the snow, were standing there. She stepped outside and shut the door behind her. "There are three other soldiers inside, but they are not friends." The corporal in charge viewed her suspiciously as she said, "You are welcome to come in to be fed and get warm, but there will be no shooting in my house on this most holy of nights." She bade all the soldiers stack their rifles outside. As warmth from the fire and food aromas spread, the ambience became more relaxed. All the soldiers spent the night there. The German soldiers even showed the Americans a map how to get back to their lines, and provided them with a compass. In the morning, each group went their own way, and when out of sight of each other, the truce was over.

Years later, Ronald Reagan used this story at a ceremony to re-unify East and West Germany—"those boys reconciled briefly in the midst of war. Surely, we allies in peacetime should honor the reconciliation of the last forty years." Then, in 1996, Ralph Blank, one of the American soldiers who had come to the Vincken cabin on the Christmas Eve fifty-two years earlier, visited Fritz Vincken in the same home. "Your mother saved my life." Fritz replied, "Her courage will never be forgotten."


