HOW DEEP IS YOUR WELL? SPIRITUAL NOURISHMENT FOR THE LONG HAUL by Mary Westfall, Transitional Presbyter



Years ago when we moved into a home nestled among the woods. about 10

minutes from town, we were not on a municipal water line and for the first time had a well. The water tasted cold and refreshing and it was nice not to get a water bill. A few years later a very dry spring led to a dramatic summer drought. Concerned about our water supply we spoke to a professional about the adequacy of our dug well. His first question was, "how deep is your well?" Through that simple question we discovered that our well was at risk due to its shallow depth. The alternative was a drilled well that would go down hundreds of feet to an immense aquafer held beneath layers of granite, a water source that was abundant, pure and available. "You've got to get down to the source," the professional added, and that is what we did with positive and lasting results

Droughts occur across the country and are something with which Californians are well acquainted. However, there is also another kind of drought, that of the soul, the inner spiritual life of each one of us. These months of pandemic, uncertainty, civil unrest, and change may have left a lot of us feeling rather dry and brittle in the depths of our inner lives. The resilience and refreshment received through corporate worship, pot-luck meals, should-to-shoulder mission projects, which sustained us for years, have given way to months of sheltering-in -place and social distancing, leaving many of us experiencing emotional and psychological weariness, perhaps even a deep spiritual thirst.

How deep is your well? That question seems relevant as we experience a dearth of good news, a season in which even our inner spiritual life may feel brittle and barren, a drought of the soul. These are the times spoken of in scripture by prophets, preachers and poets: O God, you are my God, earnestly I seek you; my

soul thirsts for you, my body longs for you, in a dry and weary land. (Psalm 63) My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. Where can I go and meet with God? (Psalm 42:2) Throughout the ages, God's people have experienced all manner of difficulty and challenge, times, perhaps like today, when people struggled to remain hopeful and spiritually refreshed. However, we need not languish, but open ourselves to the good news of the gospel reminding us from where our deepest spiritual refreshment comes, Jesus Christ, the living water that quenches our deepest thirst, the Source in which we live, move and have being.

We are in the midst of times like none we have known before. Our national political scene is as contentious and divided as anyone can remember, our streets filled with voices lifting up the injustices and structural racism affecting Black Americans, the threat of another wave of COVID-19 looming large. All of this weighs heavy upon us and we need, all the more, to ground ourselves in living water, drawing upon the rich resources our faith tradition offers. Through daily opportunities to listen deeply to God's voice through scripture and intentional prayerful meditation, we deepen our spiritual well, refreshed by the living waters Christ offers, renewed by the presence of the Holy Spirit. Such practices will sustain us through these times, offering us hope and promise like nothing else can. "Drilling down" into the vast reservoir of our Christian faith offers us insight, healing, strength that will guide and sustain us on the path ahead.

As North Central California Presbytery engages in visioning and discerning God's call, our first and most important task is to continually ground ourselves in the immense love of the One who created us, knowns us by name, loves us, that even in times of upheaval and uncertainty, we will be renewed, refreshed and reclaimed for a holy purpose. May we, individually and together, deepen our spiritual well for the long haul as we seek to faithfully follow the living God in whom all things are possible.



A Story of Change & Innovation from Carmichael Presbyterian Church submitted by Karen Gray & Mary MacDonald

When we ordain and install elders, deacons, and pastors in our congregations, one of the questions they are asked is "Will you pray for and seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love? " (Book of Order W-4.0404). All of these were needed to find a way to ordain and install CPC's newest class



of elders and deacons. In more "normal" times, we ordain and install officers during Sunday morning worship services and invite all elders to come forward to lay hands on the new officers as a prayer of blessing for their service and ministry.

Since the pandemic made all of the "normal" processes impossible, our Session and pastors had to use their "energy,

intelligence, imagination, and love" to come up with a safe, yet meaningful way to ordain and install these members who answered God's call to leadership.

At first, the hope was that we could invite incoming officers to the Sanctuary during a Sunday morning live stream service while observing safety and social distancing protocols. However, the spike in COVID-19 cases in California and the reinstatement of restrictions on indoor gatherings put an end to those plans.

So, on to Plan B (or is it Plan C at this point?). So many of us use Zoom for classes, meetings, and social gatherings, it seemed possible to have ordination and installation on Zoom as well. The date was set and the incoming officers notified. But what about the laying on of hands that is such a meaningful part of the service? Ruling Elder Mary MacDonald had the perfect solution! Stemming from an idea in discussions at a Presbytery Committee on Ministry meeting, she asked several of the current elders and deacons (and Pastor Keith DeVries) to send her a tracing of their hand. Mary transferred each handprint to felt and sewed it onto a stole-one for each incoming elder and deacon. They were delivered with a note that read in part, "During the Zoom ordination and installation service on Sunday, August 16, Pastor Keith will let you know when it is time to put the stole around your shoulders to represent the hands of your brothers and sisters in Christ. We pray that you will feel God's blessing on your ministry through the hands of those who serve alongside you."

About 60 members and friends of CPC joined the Zoom meeting and raised hands of blessing while those being ordained and installed wore their stoles. Everyone felt more connected because of the symbol of the stoles. It was not the same as actually being present and physically surrounding the new group of Elders and Deacons, but it was a good alternative. Even as this pandemic limits some

aspects of our church life, we also are discovering new practices and ways of being the church. Thanks be to God!

1001 New Worshiping Communities, a program of PC(USA)'s Mission Agency has developed an apprenticeship opportunity that has three major components:

- Inaugurating a contextual and transformative new ministry from scratch
- Participating in a cohort of peers and mentors for reflection, training and discernment
- Learning through a professional coaching session every three weeks

All apprentices and residents participate in a national training together. Participants will team-build, experiment in diverse models of worship, receive asset-based leadership analysis training, participate in a reflective anti-racism training led by the Open Table KC, receive missional theological training, and develop skills in entrepreneurial leadership and faith-based formation. 




